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## **Hidden Lake Development Enthusiastically Celebrates 6<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Participation in National Fire Protection Association's Firewise Program**

**[Angel Fire New Mexico]— Hidden Lake Development** is celebrating its 6<sup>th</sup> year of participation in the National Fire Protection Association's Firewise Communities/USA program, a voluntary initiative to protect local residents, their property and natural resources from wildfires. Since **Hidden Lake** earned the distinction as an official Firewise community, local leaders and individual homeowners have come together to make significant advances in making the community safer from wildfire.

**Hidden Lake** became a Firewise community in 2006. The community developed a Community Wildfire Protection Plan, Forest Management plan, and executed a variety of activities to help mitigate the progression of wildfire in the community

"Because wildfires are burning hotter and faster than ever before, it's more important than ever to take safety steps now," said Joe Stehling, President of the Colfax County Coalition of Firewise Communities. "Wildfires will happen, and we want to be as ready as possible to prevent damage to our community's buildings, resources and of course, our residents."

Some of the Firewise activities undertaken by the Coalition - Cimarron, Elk Ridge, Taos Pines, Ute Park, and Vermejo Park in addition to Hidden Lake - over the year include:

- Receiving a \$300,000 Hazardous Fuels Mitigation grant to clean up and thin 135 acres on 14 lots on Hidden Lake and an additional 200 acres on Elk Ridge, Taos Pines, and Ute Park under the grant.
- Conducting at least one chipper day each year. In 2011 Hidden Lake Community volunteers spent eight grueling hours chipping 125 cubic yards of slash on four properties and Hidden Lake's common area to improve fire mitigation. To date at least 20 lots have been completely thinned and cleaned up while at least six lot owners are working on thinning and clean up of dead and down material.
- Providing educational information and Firewise video at the annual Hidden Lake Property Owners Association meeting.

- Constructing the foundation for a new fire substation on Highway 120 near Hidden Lake and highway B-38, and continuing to raise funds for construction of the structure. The second annual Fire Trunk Sale (Flea Market) to raise funds for the fire station was held on 28 August, 2010.
- Developing a Forest Management Plan for the Hidden Lake common area in order to secure more grant funds for thinning and clean up in 2012.

“We are particularly proud when a community reaches an anniversary milestone like Hidden Lake said Michele Steinberg, manager of the NFPA Firewise Communities program. “Your dedicated fire and safety professionals and motivated residents have truly helped minimize wildfire risk factors, and their hard work surely has paid off.”

In order to become part of NFPA’s Firewise program, the community engaged in the following activities:

- Enlisted a wildland/urban interface specialist to complete a community assessment and create a plan that identifies agreed-upon achievable solutions to be implemented by the community.
- Sponsored a local Firewise Task Force Committee, Commission or Department which maintains the Firewise Communities/USA program and tracks its progress.
- Observed a Firewise Communities/USA Day each year that is dedicated to a local Firewise project.
- Invested a minimum of \$2.00 per capita annually in local Firewise projects.
- Submitted an annual report to Firewise Communities/USA that documents continuing compliance with the program.
